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Becoming A Franciscan Through Cursillo

In the early 1990's I was called to "quiet time." The Society of St. John the Evangelist had a retreat house in Durham, North Carolina, to which I applied for five days of silence. I was asked, and agreed to a retreat leader, as this was a new experience. Mid-morning of my second full day an elderly Brother came to my room and we discussed the days of silence. He offered the following passage from Revelation 15:20, Listen! I am standing at the door knocking, if you hear my voice and open the door, I will come in to you and eat with you, and you with me.

I pondered this scripture verse for four days, wondering why this was given to me. I thought that I had opened the door to Jesus.

Two years later, in the midst of EFM studies elsewhere, there was talk of Cursillo. I thought, "What a strange name!"

I began inquiring about Cursillo and was told that I would probably not find Cursillo welcoming because of my sexuality. I thought, well, I'll just see how I fit in. I found a Sponsor and was whisked away to the Diocesan retreat center in North Carolina. The team and participants were accepting and lovable. During the healing service, I sat and watched as people moved forward; shaking, crying, and more tears after speaking with a spiritual advisor. I was not about to take part



advisor. I was not about to take part in anything like that, and actually felt uncomfortable. (Continued on Page 3)

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Meeting Notes — National Episcopal Cursillo Committee (NECC) - 2/3/11

The National Episcopal Cursillo Committee convened in Concord, NC on February 3, 2011 hosted by All Saints' Church in Concord. The Committee members braved blizzards and high winds to arrive for their work together, and all traveled to and from the meeting safely. The Executive Committee began their work on Thursday morning with a wonderful breakfast followed by worship. The Executive Committee completed recommended work from the finance servant community and approved a preliminary 2011 Conference Budget, a NEC personnel handbook, the purchase of a new office computer, and finalized paperwork for the office administrator's enrollment in The Episcopal Church's lay pension plan. The Executive Committee then met all the newly elected district representatives for an orientation time. The full Committee arrived Thursday evening and we shared our study of the book, *In Constant Prayer* by Robert Benson. Everyone felt that the book was challenging, and we commend it to you for your study. The first day's work concluded with Compline.

The Committee continued their work on Friday and Saturday, and concluded with an Ultreya Saturday afternoon, jointly attended by Cursillistas from the Dioceses of NC and Western NC. Our special thanks to All Saints' Church in Concord for their gifts to us of hospitality, space and resources. We are most grateful for Dave Millar, who served as host community coordinator, and, especially, for Jan Millar, who cooked, cleaned and cared for us. Jan had a marvelous kitchen team who helped out, but Jan was the one who made sure we left the meeting weighing more than when we came! A final thanks to Calvin Hefner who coordinated the airport arrivals and Ken Parker who coordinated the departures for the entire Committee. Nonetheless, before long, the Spirit lifted me forward with tears in my eyes, and my nose running. As I approached the spiritual advisor, I told her I wanted to open my heart and my life to accept Jesus, the Christ, as my Lord and my Savior. At that time, I felt the Presence and knew that my life was being transformed.

Upon completion of my Cursillo experience, I went to the Parish's assistant rector, who is still my spiritual advisor, and asked him who in the Parish was on fire for Jesus. He thought for some time, replying, "No one in this Parish has a relationship with Jesus."

I came from a Parish of 1,200 members and could not believe that no one had that love and relationship with Jesus, the Christ. He said, "If you want to be with people who love and want to follow Jesus, consider becoming a Franciscan. They live the Gospels of Jesus, the Christ."

I applied for Aspirant status and was accepted after many months. The Franciscans moved slower then, compared with today. After four years I was professed.

As I look back on my Franciscan life, and the Scripture on which I was to meditate, the door was opened as I made my Cursillo, and my Cursillo took me to the life of St. Francis. Cursillo gave me confidence in my Parish life to become a Spiritual Formation leader for six years, a Chaplain for prison ministry and a Franciscan Chaplain for our area. Through the Cursillo movement I have sponsored about 18 Cursillistas, served on many teams, served as Lay Rector for both the Western Diocese and the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina. I now serve on our Secretariat as Lay Director. I also serve on the National Episcopal Cursillo Committee as a layman representative for the Southeast Region and serve on the Cursillo Leadership Development Committee.

I found that Cursillo gave me an excellent foundation to live the life of a Franciscan with Piety, Study and Action.

Part Of My First Day

Recent Sunday Early Services have elevated my awareness of the Book Of Matthew, and its powerful passages.

On reflection from these scriptures, I've come to understand that we're either "spiritual and social engineers, or we're spiritual and social parasites."

A text I recently finished, requiring me to read little more than one or two pages a day, was written by John Pollock, titled *The Apostle, A Life of Paul*. The author moved me to understand that Paul's ministry was a mission of personal conscience, and integrity — to who he was, and what he loved, and respected. His repeated public humiliations and hardships over his multiple decade ministry seemed to create an ongoing, elevated



understanding in him of what Christ's Gospel was about — hardships didn't seem to slow his understanding and follow-through — but rather enhanced his spiritual development and focus — he was to spread The Gospel — everywhere he went. And each destination and challenge gave new meaning to how The Gospel was to be interpreted, and delivered!

The text has dramatically changed my understanding of Paul's ministry, and the letters Paul wrote, to which we and Christianity benefit. I recommend it to anyone who wants to be recharged, or has the courage to look inwardly at yourself.

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
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God Is Winking At You

In an e-mail recently, Sid Chadwick gave me credit for the term "godwinks." As much as I'd love to say that I came up with the idea, it's actually the brain child of writer SQuire Rushnell (and yes, he does capitalize the "Q"). The book When God Winks was recommended to me by one of my friends in my reunion group. What a blessing!

"A godwink," writes Rushnell, "is what some people would call a coincidence, an answered prayer, or simply an experience where you'd say, 'Wow, what are the odds of that!" What does it mean? Rushnell says it's "a message of reassurance from above, directly to you, out of six billion people on the planet, saying 'Hey, kid . . . I'm thinking of you! Keep the faith! You're never alone."

How about an illustration? When our church, St. Clement's, was just getting started and we were worshiping in the chapel of a funeral home, we were hard pressed at times to have a priest. That particular Sunday, there was no priest, no acolyte. Just me. I was standing out front waiting for 11 o'clock to come, thinking about my Morning Prayer service ahead and feeling sorry for myself because there weren't very many people in the sanctuary. All of a sudden, I saw this gorgeous Jaguar up on the hill at the intersection. I'm not proud of this, but I said a little prayer. "Please, God," I said, "Let that Jaguar turn in here for church." We were poor, trying to raise money for land and a priest (and everything else). What do you know . . . the car made the turn and a lady named Cindy got out



and came in to church! She turned out to be a very active part of our young church with a gift for fundraising and organization! Now if that wasn't a godwink, I don't know what one is.

It was more than a "feel good moment." It was an affirmation that we were on the right track as a small community of faith, that God was watching after us.

I have MANY godwink stories. Rushnell suggests that you spend some time doing "godwink mapping", digging up the godwinks that we've overlooked, forgotten or ignored. You do that by looking for the turning points in your life, "those crossroads when your life's path took a whole new direction." Think of them as signposts on your journey of life, giving you guidance on where to steer your life.

Often at reunion meetings, my "moment closest to Christ" is a godwink. I've learned to really pay attention to these moments. They are God speaking to me. Are you paying attention?

The NECC meeting included time for district meetings, group reunion, worship and subcommittee work as well as time for the work of the entire Committee. The NECC approved a preliminary budget for the 2011 Conference in Phoenix, prioritized a list of possible workshop topics for the conference and discussed the pending decision about a keynote speaker. The communications subcommittee was given approval to hire a website vendor to upgrade our web hosting capabilities and to improve our ability to provide the entire Fourth Day community with materials and information more quickly. The publications subcommittee completed work on the revision of the "Secretariat" book for the library and also mapped out a better method to get NEC materials and library translated into Spanish. Watch for news of the Spanish materials being available later this year. The Cursillo Leaders Development subcommittee focused their work on identifying dioceses in need of support and also developing ways to strengthen the Fourth Day activities within Episcopal Cursillo.

The Committee approved our participation in a nation-wide ecumenical survey of Fourth Day movements. The survey will be distributed to all cursillistas by e-mail and we hope that you will watch for the web link and that you will take the short survey. The NECC will be able to extract the information and have a better sense of the health of Episcopal Cursillo and will also be able to compare that data to other Fourth Day movements. Please help us with this effort.

The Committee also had the opportunity to meet with Bishop William Gregg and Bishop Chip Marble, assisting Bishops of NC, and to also meet with the Secretariat for the Diocese of NC. We shared best practices from NC and from around the country and we talked about opportunities to strengthen the Cursillo movement. Our thanks to the NC Bishops and Secretariat for taking time to meet with the NECC.

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My Fourth Day

Practicing what we learned during our Cursillo weekend is not difficult when all is going well in your life. We are inclined to say thank you and to remember that we are blessed.

Remembering Piety, Study, and Action is not terribly difficult when things are going badly. After all when life is not working according to our plan we occasionally consult God for ideas and may even pay attention to His suggestions.

The challenge is when you are in the middle. The intensity that brings things into focus during times of joy or struggle is missing when we are plodding along doing fairly well and staying out of trouble. We get distracted by the everyday mundane and neglect to allocate time that could be spent seeking to strengthen our spiritual life.



- When you are in the middle you are most vulnerable to the snares of the hunter [read the Screwtape Letters by CS Lewis to understand how that happens].
- · When you are in the middle you float along which makes you less able to stay spiritually grounded.
- When you are in the middle it is like wearing a pair of glasses with an out of date prescription, you can see but the edges are fuzzy.

Setting aside even a small time for prayer [Piety] and reading [Study] enables us to be better able to respond in grace when an opportunity for ministry [Action] comes before us.

I became very involved and we worked to get the Cursillo #1 scheduled. In those days the idea was that the man would go first and then two weeks later the wife. I had to go even though I knew everything that would be going on. I played guitar and was asked to help with the music. I know that all of the people thought I was a TEAM member, but I was not.

Hearing and seeing all that went on that weekend was really great. Cursillo is put on by our peers, people who share what they were like and how God changed them. How depressed



they were and now they have the Joy of the Lord. Wonderful stories to show the path to the Lord and enhances the scripture you have heard or read. Having been an Episcopalian my entire life and being very active in the church plus married to a priest, I found that being on the weekend help me to focus on what God had done for me and now what could I do for him? Every time a Cursillo is put on each person comes away having had a unique experience. "How was your weekend?" Starts you thinking "How do I explain?" Sometimes we don't have the words, AWESOME! fills the bill.

For 14 years I have been involved with prison ministry. It has been a joy to go into the prison being God's Ambassador seeing their faces as they have received forgiveness, heard about the Grace and Mercy of God and hearing what Christ can do for them.

"All have sinned and come short of the Glory of God." Through Cursillo I found a way to bridge that gap. Hope you will try it.


